

There's a lot of non-academic activities a student can do at UWM. On campus you can enjoy concerts, art exhibitions, dance performances, and films by students and faculty artists. You can cheer for UWM athletic teams and keep in shape at the Klotsche Center. The Center and the campus in general are accessible to disabled students. All students are eligible for medical services at the Student Health Center.

Campus social life is centered in the UWM Union, with its bookstore, craft center, movie theater, art gallery, recreation center, food outlets, credit union/bank, offices for student organizations, and frequent concerts and other performances. Sandburg Residence Halls have a restaurant, grocery store, movie theater, new fitness center, and computer lab. You can share a suite at the residence halls or rent lodging near campus and commute to the University using express bus services provided through the UBUS program. The UPOOL/CARPOOL & UPARK services offer carpooling, off-campus parking and shuttle bus service. Hundreds of campus groups give students a voice in University life and they are represented on University committees, publish newspapers, and are involved in radio station WUWM-FM 89.7

As a student at Wisconsin's major urban university, you have access to the employment, social, cultural, and recreational opportunities of a large city, while enjoying the closeness of the UWM community.



Thanks to a generous grant, the Department of History and the College of Letters and Science at The University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee is pleased to again announce the Zeidler International Scholar Award. The award will go to a foreign student in support of his/her pursuit of the Master's degree in American history at UWM. To qualify, the student must have completed all requirements for an undergraduate degree by May 2007 and have substantial preparation in American Studies and/or American history. For full aid for the MA degree the recipient must apply for admission to the UW-Milwaukee Graduate School and for a teaching assistantship in the History Department. He/she must also meet visa and other requirements for international study in the U.S. and be fluent in English. He/she must have obtained a minimum TOEFL score of 550 PBT or 213 CBT, and a minimum IELTS score of 6.5 or higher.

The UW-Milwaukee's history master's degree program usually requires two years to complete. Therefore, the award will provide sufficient funds for travel for two years, and the scholar having also won a Teaching Assistant will receive a stipend of approximately \$10,000 for the academic year 2007-08, a tuition waiver, and health insurance benefits. Teaching assistants work with a History faculty member in a survey course. They attend lectures, conduct five discussion sections each week, and grade

papers and examinations. The Teaching Assistantship is renewable for a second year upon satisfactory performance. UW-Milwaukee's Office of International Student and Scholar Services strongly recommends that international graduate student applicants apply for admission by January 1 of the year he/she, wishes to enter the school, to allow enough time to obtain appropriate government documents, including the I-20 form and a student visa.
